- **Establishment:** The Direct Service Tribes (DST) Advisory Committee hereby establishes the "Direct Service Tribes Advisory Committee Recognition and Appreciation Awards."
 - **Purpose:** The Direct Service Tribes Advisory Committee Recognition and Appreciation Awards are established to acknowledge and bestow gratitude upon individuals and groups that have advanced the goals and mission of the DST Advisory Committee (DSTAC) and DST. Award recipients are individuals and groups that have exhibited personal and professional commitment in the delivery of quality healthcare services and programs through exceptional leadership and performance for the benefit of American Indians, Alaskan Natives and Indian tribes and communities.
 - **Background:** The DSTAC was established to provide leadership, advocacy and policy guidance for Indian tribes that receive primary health care directly from the Indian Health Service (IHS). The DSTAC has been actively defining the role of the DST within the IHS. The DSTAC coordinates an annual meeting that provides a national forum for the discussion of issues of importance to DST; advocates for tribal representation on agency and Department-level workgroups and committees that address policy and funding issues impacting DST; and participates in the IHS budget formulation process by developing budget priorities and recommendations solely reflecting DST needs and concerns.

In 2009 during the DST National Meeting in Oklahoma City, OK, the DSTAC recognized for the first time several tribal and federal Indian health advocates with awards for their professional contributions to the advancement of Indian health care services, policy and leadership. Examples of such efforts and contributions included exceptional initiative or leadership in carrying out activities to improve the direct care programs and benefit the IHS environment.

The Awards also represented the promotion and respect of tribal cultures, customs and traditions, consistent with all aspects of DSTAC activities.
