**Exciting News: [American Indian College Fund to Administer Scholarship Fund for Native Americans](#)**

The Denver-based American Indian College Fund has announced that it has been selected by the U.S. Department of the Interior to administer the \$60 million Indian Education Scholarship Holding Fund.

The fund was designated as part of the \$3.4 billion settlement in *Cobell v. Salazar* by lead plaintiff Elouise Cobell, a member of the Blackfeet Nation in Montana, who initiated the class action lawsuit in 1996 on behalf of American Indians whose trust fund lands had been mismanaged by the federal government. Cobell passed away in October 2011 at the age of 65. Under the agreement with the Department of the Interior, the fund will distribute 20 percent of its scholarship monies to the American Indian Graduate Center in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

"We are honored by the confidence the government and plaintiffs have demonstrated in us," said Dr. Cheryl Crazy Bull, president and CEO of the American Indian College Fund. "They have confirmed what our supporters know: The American Indian College Fund has a proven history of twenty-four years of leadership and fiscal responsibility. We are rooted in advancing educational and vocational scholarships for Native peoples while maintaining strong relationships with Native communities...We look forward to working with the special trustees of the Indian Education Scholarship Holding Fund to discuss how we will implement and raise additional funding to improve access to education for all Indian people, regardless of financial circumstance, transforming Indian Country."



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### ➤ **OJJDP Announces Tribal Youth Funding Opportunities:**

The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) has announced the following fiscal year 2013 funding opportunities:

- **Tribal Youth Program Training and Technical Assistance.** OJJDP seeks to establish a Tribal Youth Program training and technical assistance provider. The award recipient will provide culturally appropriate training, support, resources, information, and other related technical assistance to OJJDP's tribal grantees and all federally recognized American Indian and Alaska Native tribes. Applications are due by May 6, 2013.
- **Evaluation of Programs for Tribal Youth.** This solicitation will fund one or more evaluation studies to produce findings of practical use to tribal communities, practitioners, administrators, and policymakers in the identification, adaptation, and testing of promising programs, policies, and strategies for tribal juvenile justice and delinquency prevention. Applications are due by May 14, 2013.

➤ **Leadership Academies on Reducing Child Hunger through Afterschool and Summer Meals**

The next round of the “Cities Combating Hunger through Afterschool and Summer Meal Programs” initiative will begin with two regional leadership academies held in late May and early June, each of which will be open to 10 city teams. These two-day trainings will provide three-person teams of city officials and other key stakeholders with information about federal funding for afterschool and summer meals; strategies for linking these programs to facilitate year-round provision of out-of-school meals; ideas for increasing children's participation; and additional advice and best practices shared by national experts. 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### ➤ **State Public Health Actions to Prevent and Control Diabetes, Heart Disease, Obesity and Associated Risk Factors and Promote School Health**

This grant (FOA – DP13-1305) outlines an approach to preventing and reducing the risk factors associated with childhood and adult obesity, diabetes, heart disease, and stroke; it also addresses management of these chronic diseases. The activities and strategies outlined in this FOA are organized by the four chronic disease prevention and health promotion domains: 1) Epidemiology and surveillance; 2) Environmental approaches that promote health and support and reinforce healthful behaviors; 3) Health system interventions to improve the effective delivery and use of clinical and other preventive services; and 4) Community-clinical linkages to support cardiovascular disease (CVD) and diabetes prevention and control efforts and the management of chronic diseases. ### **REMINDER: Healthy Eating Research 2013 Call for Proposals**

The 2013 Call for Proposals (CFP) is for two types of awards aimed at providing advocates, decision-makers, and policy-makers with evidence to reverse the childhood obesity epidemic. The award types are:

- **Round 8** grants, representing the majority of RWJF's investment in research through this program. Approximately \$1.4 million will be awarded through Round 8. Each grant will award up to \$170,000 for a maximum funding period of 18 months. There are **three deadlines** for receipt of **concept papers** (all by **3pm ET**): **February 13, April 24, and July 10.**



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- **RWJF New Connections** grants through *Healthy Eating Research*, which support policy-relevant research of early-career investigators from historically disadvantaged and underrepresented communities. Up to two RWJF *New Connections* grants will be awarded through the *Healthy Eating Research* program in this round of funding. Awards will be for 12- to 18-month grants of up to \$100,000 each. The **deadline** for receipt of **concept papers** is **March 27, 2013 by 3pm ET**.

- **Promoting Adolescent Health through School-Based HIV/STD Prevention and School-Based Surveillance - Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)**

**Deadline:** Letter of Intent (LOI) Deadline Date: March 15, 2013, 11:59 p.m. U.S. EST, Application Deadline Date: April 26, 2013, 11:59 p.m. U.S. EST

**Amount:** It is anticipated that approximately \$13,000,000 will be available in year 1 and approximately \$17,000,000 for years 2-5. This funding will support approximately 75 agencies for Strategy 1: School-Base Surveillance; 14 SEA/TEA and 15 LEA agencies for Strategy 2: School-Based HIV/STD Prevention (SBHSP); 6 NGO for Strategy 3: Capacity Building Assistance for SBHSP; and 3 LEA and 1 NGO for Strategy 4: School-Centered HIV/STD Prevention for YMSM.

**Description:** The primary purpose of this funding is to build the capacity of districts and schools to effectively contribute to the reduction of HIV infection and other STD among adolescents; the reduction of disparities in HIV infection and other STD experienced by specific adolescent sub-populations; and the conducting of school-based surveillance through YRBS and Profiles implementation. Program activities are expected to reinforce efforts to reduce teen pregnancy rates, due to the shared risk factors for, and intervention activities to address, HIV infection, other STD, and teen pregnancy.

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➤ **The Office of Adolescent Health (OAH) - Pregnancy Assistance Fund**

**Deadline:** Non-binding letters of intent are due March 15, 2013 by 5 p.m. ET.

Complete applications are due April 10, 2013 by 5 p.m. ET.

**Amount:** OAH anticipates that up to \$24 million will be available to fund up to 32 grants in the amount of \$500,000 to \$1,500,000 per year for a four-year project period.

**Description:** This notice solicits applications from States, which include the District of Columbia, any commonwealth, possession, or other territory of the United States and any Federally-recognized Indian tribe or reservation, the development and implementation of programs for expectant and parenting teens, women, fathers and their families.

➤ **U.S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR - Employment and Training Administration Notice of Availability of Funds and Solicitation for Grant Applications for YouthBuild Grants**

**Deadline: March 19, 2013.** Applications must be received no later than 4:00:00 p.m. Eastern Time.

**Amount:** The availability of approximately \$75 million in grant funds authorized by the YouthBuild provisions of the Workforce Investment Act [29 USC 2918a]. The final amount available depends on the amount of funds appropriated for YouthBuild in Fiscal Year (FY) 2013.

**Cost Sharing or Matching**

Cost sharing is required as a condition for application. Applicants must provide new cash or in-kind resources equivalent to exactly 25 percent of the grant award amount as “matching” funds while additional cost sharing above 25 percent may be committed towards the grant as “leveraged” funds.. Please note that neither prior investments nor Federal resources may be counted towards the matching funds



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threshold. Applicants that do not specify matching funds of exactly 25 percent as part of their application will be deemed non-responsive and will not be reviewed. Construction materials that are acquired without grant funds and are used for approved projects as part of the training for YouthBuild participants may be used in fulfilling the 25 percent match requirement.

To be allowable as part of match, an expenditure must be an allowable charge for Federal grant funds. Determinations of allowable costs will be made in accordance with the applicable Federal cost principles as indicated in Section IV.E. If the cost would not be allowable as a grant-funded charge, then it cannot be counted toward the applicant's matching funds.

### ➤ **OVW Fiscal Year 2013 Legal Assistance for Victims Grant Program**

**Deadline:** March 19, 2013

**Amount:** Up to \$500,000

**Description:** The Legal Assistance for Victims Grant Program (LAV Program) is intended to increase the availability of civil and criminal legal assistance needed to effectively aid adult and youth victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking who are seeking relief in legal matters arising as a consequence of that abuse or violence.

The LAV Grant Program makes awards to law school clinics, domestic violence victims' programs and shelters, bar associations, rape crisis centers and other sexual assault services programs, private nonprofit entities, Indian Tribal governments and Tribal organizations, Territorial organizations, legal aid or statewide legal services, and faith- and/or community-based legal service providers. Grant funds may be used to provide direct legal services to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking in matters arising from abuse or violence and to provide enhanced training for lawyers representing these victims as well as advocates. The objective of the LAV Grant Program is to develop innovative, collaborative projects that provide quality representation to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

➤ **OVW Fiscal Year 2013 Safe Havens: Supervised Visitation and Safe Exchange Grant Program**

**Deadline:** March 20, 2013

**Amount:** Applicants should carefully consider the resources needed to successfully implement the proposed project and present a realistic budget that accurately reflects project costs. Supervised Visitation Program funds for FY 2013 will be awarded based on the following guidelines:

- Up to \$400,000 for a three-year development project;
- Up to \$350,000 for a three-year continuation project with one visitation site;
- Up to \$500,000 for a three-year continuation project with two visitation sites; or
- Up to \$650,000 for a three-year continuation project with three visitation sites.

OVW has the discretion to award grants for greater or lesser amounts than requested and to negotiate the scope of work and budget with applicants prior to award of a grant.

**Description:** The Safe Havens: Supervised Visitation and Safe Exchange Grant Program (Supervised Visitation Program) provides an opportunity for communities to support the supervised visitation and safe exchange of children in situations involving domestic violence, dating violence, child abuse, sexual assault, or stalking. The risk of violence is often greater for victims of domestic violence and their children after separation from an abusive situation. Even after separation, batterers often use visitation and exchange of children as an opportunity to inflict additional emotional, physical, and/or psychological abuse on victims and their children.





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Visitation and exchange services provided through the Supervised Visitation Program should reflect a clear understanding of the dynamics of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking; the impact of domestic violence on children; and the importance of holding offenders accountable for their actions. States, tribal governments, and units of local government are eligible to apply, and they must partner with a non-profit, non-governmental victim services provider and a state or local court.

- **HUD: Department of Housing and Urban Development Transformation Initiative: Sustainable Construction in Indian Country Small Grant Program Grant**

**Deadline:** March 25, 2013

**Amount:** HUD anticipates that approximately 4 to 8 awards will be made ranging from \$50,000 to a maximum of \$100,000 per award. The maximum grant performance period for an award under this program is 24 months.

**Description:** HUD invites applicants to submit proposals for funding that encourages the use of sustainable construction practices in Native American housing. Proposals should take into account the multiple geographic, economic and cultural aspects of Native American residential design and construction. HUD seeks applications in four broad areas: demonstration, technical assistance, curriculum development/training, and information dissemination related to sustainable construction in the Native Community. Activities performed under the Sustainable Construction in Indian Country Small Grant Program should document the impact of one or more innovative approaches to sustainable construction in Indian Country, identify a set of lessons learned, and then develop, deploy or distribute a tool highlighting those lessons. This tool should support learning without the need for instructors, facilitators or other external assistance. The training media may include, but are not limited to, a blog, DVD, publication, and video. Media of this type is expected to be maintained by the grantee until the end of the agreement.

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➤ **OVW Fiscal Year 2013 Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders Program**

**Deadline:** March 25, 2013

**Amount:** Applicants should carefully consider the resources needed to successfully implement the proposed project and present a realistic budget that accurately reflects project costs.

OVW has the discretion to award grants for greater or lesser amounts than requested and to negotiate the scope of work and budget with applicants prior to award of a grant.

Awards under the Arrest Program for FY 2013 are as follows:

Service Area Population Budget Cap

- Up to 500,000 \$300,000
- 500,001 to 900,000 \$650,000
- Over 900,000 \$900,000

**Description:** Sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking are crimes that require the criminal justice system to hold offenders accountable for their actions through investigation, arrest, and prosecution of violent offenders, and through close judicial scrutiny and management of offender behavior.

The discretionary Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders Program (Arrest Program) is designed to encourage State, local, and Tribal governments and State, local, and Tribal courts to treat sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking as serious violations of criminal law requiring the coordinated involvement of the entire criminal justice system. The Arrest Program challenges the community to listen, communicate, identify problems, and share ideas that will result in new responses to ensure victim safety and offender accountability. 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➤ **OVW Fiscal Year 2013 Rural Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking Assistance Program**

**Deadline:** March 26, 2013

**Amount:** Applicants should carefully consider the resources needed to successfully implement the proposed project and present a realistic budget that accurately reflects project costs. OVW has the discretion to award grants for greater or lesser amounts than requested and to negotiate the scope of work and budget with applicants prior to award of a grant. Funding levels under the Rural Program for FY 2013 are as follows:

- There is no maximum award amount; and
- Although there are no budget caps this fiscal year, it is unlikely that grant awards will exceed \$1 million in funding.

**Description:** The primary purpose of the Rural Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking Assistance Program (Rural Program) is to enhance the safety of rural victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking and support projects uniquely designed to address and prevent these crimes in rural areas. The Rural Program welcomes applications that propose innovative solutions to achieving this goal and encourages collaboration among criminal justice agencies, victim services providers, social services agencies, health professionals, and other community organizations to overcome the problem of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and ensure that victim safety is paramount while providing services to victims.

The Rural Program recognizes the richness of diversity in rural communities and areas across the country, and encourages applicants to implement innovative approaches, through capacity-building and partnerships, to address the critical needs of victims in a manner that affirms a victim's culture, effectively addresses language and communications barriers, and ensures accessible services for all victims. ➤ **Planning Grants for the NIH Building Infrastructure Leading to Diversity (BUILD) Initiative (P20)**

**Deadline:** Letter of Intent due – April 10<sup>th</sup>, 2103. Application due May 11, 2013.

**Amount:** \$150,000. The NIH Common Fund intends to commit approximately \$3,000,000 in FY 2013. Up to 15 awards are anticipated in fiscal year 2013, contingent upon availability of funds and receipt of a sufficient number of meritorious applications.

**Description:** The purpose of this Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) is to encourage institutions with expertise and innovative strategies for developing research and mentoring opportunities for undergraduate students from backgrounds underrepresented in biomedical research to submit applications for 6 month planning grants for the NIH Building Infrastructure Leading to Diversity (BUILD) initiative. The BUILD initiative aims to increase the diversity of the NIH-funded workforce by supporting collaborative programs that include novel approaches for enhancing undergraduate education, training, and mentorship, as well as infrastructure support and faculty development to facilitate those approaches. BUILD planning grants are intended to help institutions develop the necessary partnerships and infrastructure needed to be competitive for the BUILD initiative.

**Description:** The purpose of this Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) is to encourage organizations with experience in the mentorship of individuals underrepresented in the biomedical research workforce to submit planning grant applications for the NIH National Research Mentoring Network (NRMN). The NRMN will establish a nationwide consortium to provide networking and mentorship experiences for individuals from backgrounds underrepresented in biomedical research from the undergraduate to junior faculty level. Planning grant applications must propose a plan to develop the partnerships and infrastructure needed to be competitive for the NRMN initiative.

- **Grants to Expand Care Coordination through the Use of Technology-Assisted Care in Targeted Areas of Need**

**Deadline:** April 10, 2013

**Amount:** Up to \$280,000 per year

**Description:** The purpose of the TCE-TAC Program is to expand and/or enhance the capacity of substance abuse treatment providers to serve persons in treatment who have been underserved because of lack of access to treatment in their immediate community due to transportation concerns, an inadequate number of substance abuse treatment providers in their community, and/or financial constraints. The use of technology, including web-based services, smart phones, and behavioral health electronic applications (e-apps), will expand and/or enhance the ability of providers to effectively communicate with persons in treatment and to track and manage their health to ensure treatment and services are available where and when needed.

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➤ **Evaluating the Effectiveness of State, Local and Tribal Responses to Violence Committed Against Indian Women Living in Tribal Communities**

**Deadline:** April 22, 2013 (Applicants must register with Grants.gov prior to submitting an application. OJP urges applicants to **register 72 hours prior to** the application submission deadline. The deadline to apply for funding under this announcement is **11:59 p.m. eastern time** on **April 22, 2013.**)

**Amount:** NIJ anticipates that up to a total of \$500,000 may become available for one or two awards made through this solicitation. **All awards are subject to the availability of appropriated funds and to any modifications or additional requirements that may be imposed by law.** NIJ funding for an individual research project rarely exceeds \$500,000, though total funding for projects requiring multiple years to complete has exceeded \$1 million in some cases.

Applicants should be aware that the total period for an award ordinarily will not exceed 3 years.

**Description:** Title IX, Section 904(a) of the Violence Against Women and Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005 (VAWA 2005), Public Law Number 109-162 (codified at 42 U.S.C. § 3796gg-10 note), calls for the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) to conduct analyses and research on violence against Indian women living in Indian Country. In conducting its analyses and research, this section asks NIJ to, in consultation with the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), conduct a “national baseline study” focusing on domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and murder, and evaluating the effectiveness of responses to those violations. To date, NIJ has made significant progress in evaluating the effectiveness of federal responses to crimes committed against American Indian and Alaska Native women living in tribal communities. However, State, local, and tribal responses have not been evaluated. This solicitation seeks proposals to conduct evaluations of promising programs that effectively respond to violence against Indian women living in tribal communities managed by State, local, or tribal governments.

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➤ **USDOJ: Department of Justice - Office of Justice Programs National Institute of Justice Research and Evaluation on Violence Against Women: Teen Dating Violence, Sexual Violence, and Intimate Partner Violence - FY 2013 Grant**

**Deadline:** All applications are due by 11:59 p.m. eastern time on April 22, 2013.

**Amount:** Applicants should carefully consider the resources needed to successfully implement the project proposed and present a realistic budget that accurately reflects project costs. Awards under the Culturally Specific Services Program for FY 2013 will be made for up to \$300,000.

OVW has the discretion to make grants for greater or lesser amounts than requested and to negotiate the scope of work and budget with applicants prior to award of a grant.

**Description:** The grant award period is 24 months. Budgets must reflect 24 months of project activity, and the total “estimated funding” (block 15) on the SF-424 must reflect 24 months.

Advocates report that survivors are more inclined to seek services from organizations that are familiar with their culture, language and background and that there is no “one size fits all” approach to adequately address these critical needs. Culturally specific community-based organizations are more likely to understand the complex multi-layered challenges and obstacles that victims from their communities face when attempting to access services. Culturally specific community-based organizations are also better equipped to form essential relationships and engage their communities in the creation and implementation of services relevant to the diverse and unique needs of the victims.

This discretionary grant program is designed to fund new and existing programs that provide culturally specific services to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking victims. The program also supports the development of innovative culturally specific strategies and projects to enhance access to services for victims who face obstacles to using traditional services and resources.
