Clinicians serving American Indians and Alaska Native people are invited to participate in the Opioid and Substance Use Disorders ECHO Clinic, operated by the Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board. The program provides comprehensive information for clinicians to integrate evidence-based substance use disorder treatment with holistic, culturally appropriate care to successfully deal with the effects of opioid use disorder. The program will offer a 2 day in person training with data waiver, and 12 subsequent telehealth sessions.
