NPAIHB COVID-19 Weekly Data Update

40 Portland Area I/T/Us reporting to date

- ▶ 31 tribal clinics/health programs; 6 IHS service units; 3 urban clinics
- ▶ Reports cover 81% of 43 tribes



AI/AN COVID-19 Deaths Reported to NPAIHB or Indian Health Service

- **23** total deaths of AI/AN people in the Northwest have been reported to the NWTEC surveillance system or Indian Health Service as of 7/5
 - Includes 2 additional deaths reported since 6/28
 - All 23 deaths reported in WA
 - ▶ 1 early SNF death of an AI/AN individual from a member tribe, not reported in our data
 - > 24 total deaths from surveillance and anecdotal data



NPAIHB COVID-19 Surveillance Survey

- Data collection for Portland Area:
 - ► Testing results & patient status
 - Clinic staffing, staff exposure/illness
 - PPE and test kit status
- ALL tribes and I/T/U clinics should report:
 - Daily reporting <u>required</u> for Abbott ID NOW analyzer sites
 - Other tribes: daily if possible, weekly at minimum












COVID-19 Hospitalizations

1,125 Oregonians have been **hospitalized** for COVID-19 (About **11%** of confirmed cases)

322 Oregonians received care in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU)
(About 29% of hospitalizations)



New COVID-19 Cases Per Day




COVID-19 Deaths Per Day









Appropriations & Budget Formulation

FY 2021 Appropriations:

H.R. 2 INVEST in America Act

- Introduced by Rep. DeFazio (D-OR) on 6/11/20 and passed in the House on 7/1/20: Tribal provisions include:
 - Sec. 34104. 21st Century Indian Health Program Hospitals and Outpatient Health Care Facilities. Provides \$5 billion in total funding for fiscal years 2021 through 2025 for the planning, design, construction, modernization, and renovation of hospitals and outpatient health care facilities within the IHS.
 - Sec. 81611—81612 in a Tribal Water Infrastructure section, provides needed funding for the planning, design, construction, modernization, improvement, and renovation of water, sewer, and solid waste sanitation facilities located on tribal land that are listed on the Indian Health Service's Sanitation Facilities Deficiency List.



S.3937 - the Special Diabetes Program Reauthorization Act of 2020

- Introduced by Senator McSally alongside Senator Sinema and Senator Murkowski. This crucial bill would:
 - Provide 5 years of guaranteed funding for the life-saving Special Diabetes Program for Indians (SDPI);
 - Increase SDPI funds to \$200 million overall the first increase in sixteen years; and,
 - Authorize Tribes and Tribal organizations to receive SDPI awards through P.L. 93-638 self-determination and self-governance contracts and compacts.
