NPAIHB COVID-19 Weekly Data Update

36 Portland Area I/T/Us reporting to date

- ▶ 27 tribal clinics/health programs; 6 IHS service units; 3 urban clinics
- ▶ Reports cover 70% of 43 tribes

I/T/U PPE Supply Status

- ▶ Adequate (3+ mos): 12
- ▶ Limited (1-3 mos): 4
- ▶ Inadequate (<1 mo): 2
- ▶ Critical (>1 wk): 0

NPAIHB/IHS Portland Area Testing Data* as of June 28:

- ▶ Total Tests: 11,039
- ▶ Positive: 867**
- ▶ Negative: 9,864
- ▶ Cumulative Percent Positive: 7.8% (last week: 7.2%)

I/T/U Test Kit Supply Status

- ▶ Adequate (3+ mos): 4
- ▶ Limited (1-3 mos): 9
- ▶ Inadequate (<1 mo): 3
- ▶ Critical (>1 wk): 0

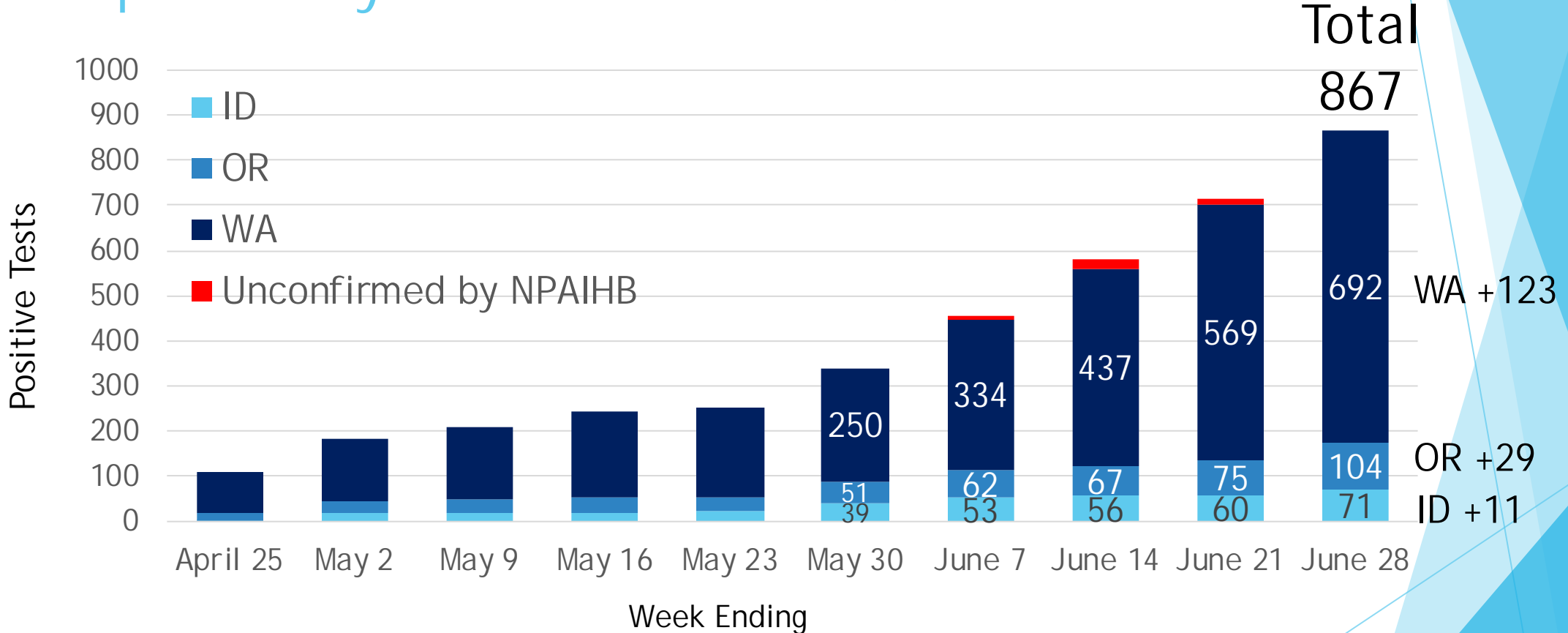

AI/AN COVID-19 Deaths Reported to NPAIHB or Indian Health Service

- ▶ 21 total deaths of AI/AN people in the Northwest have been reported to the NWTEC surveillance system or Indian Health Service as of 6/28
 - ▶ Includes 5 additional deaths reported since 6/21
 - ▶ All 21 deaths reported in WA
 - ▶ 1 early SNF death of an AI/AN individual from a member tribe, not reported in our data
 - ▶ 22 total deaths from surveillance and anecdotal data



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NPAIHB COVID-19 Surveillance Survey

- ▶ Data collection for Portland Area:
 - ▶ Testing results & patient status
 - ▶ Clinic staffing, staff exposure/illness
 - ▶ PPE and test kit status
- ▶ ALL tribes and I/T/U clinics should report:
 - ▶ Daily reporting required for Abbott ID NOW analyzer sites
 - ▶ Other tribes: daily if possible, weekly at minimum

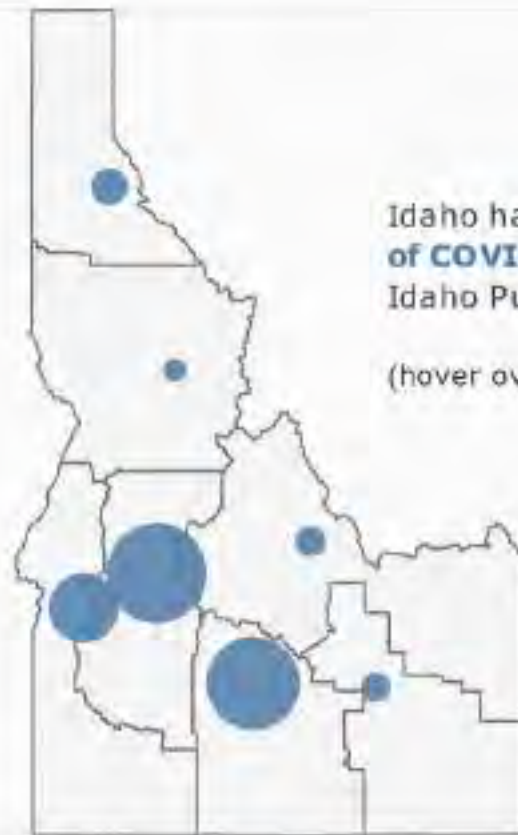
Cases by County and Public Health District Maps²

View total persons tested

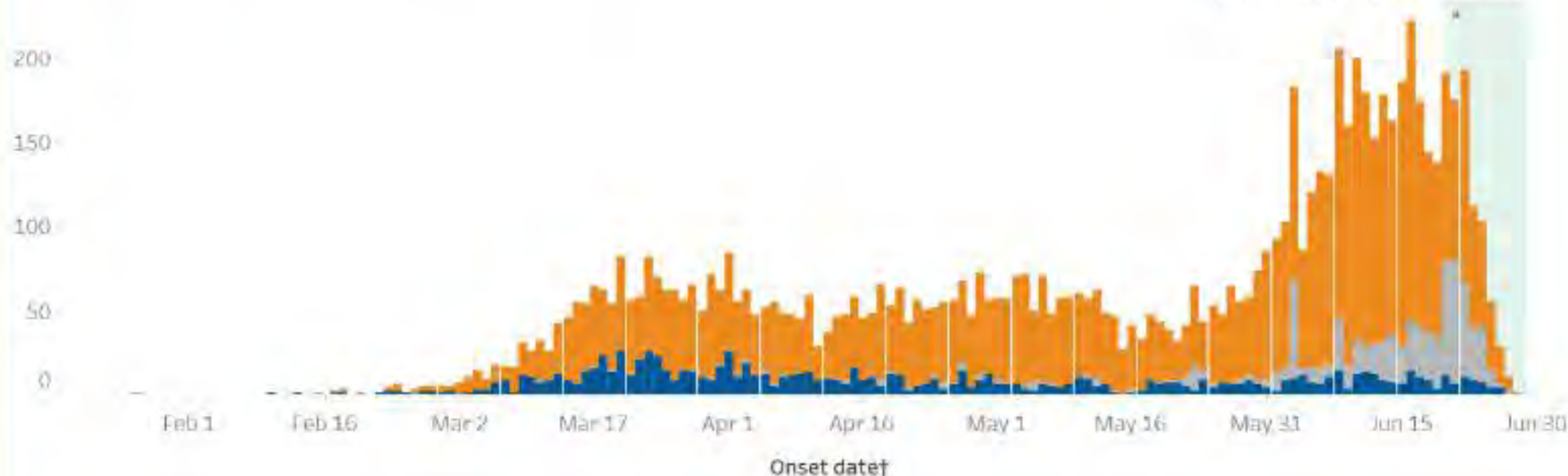

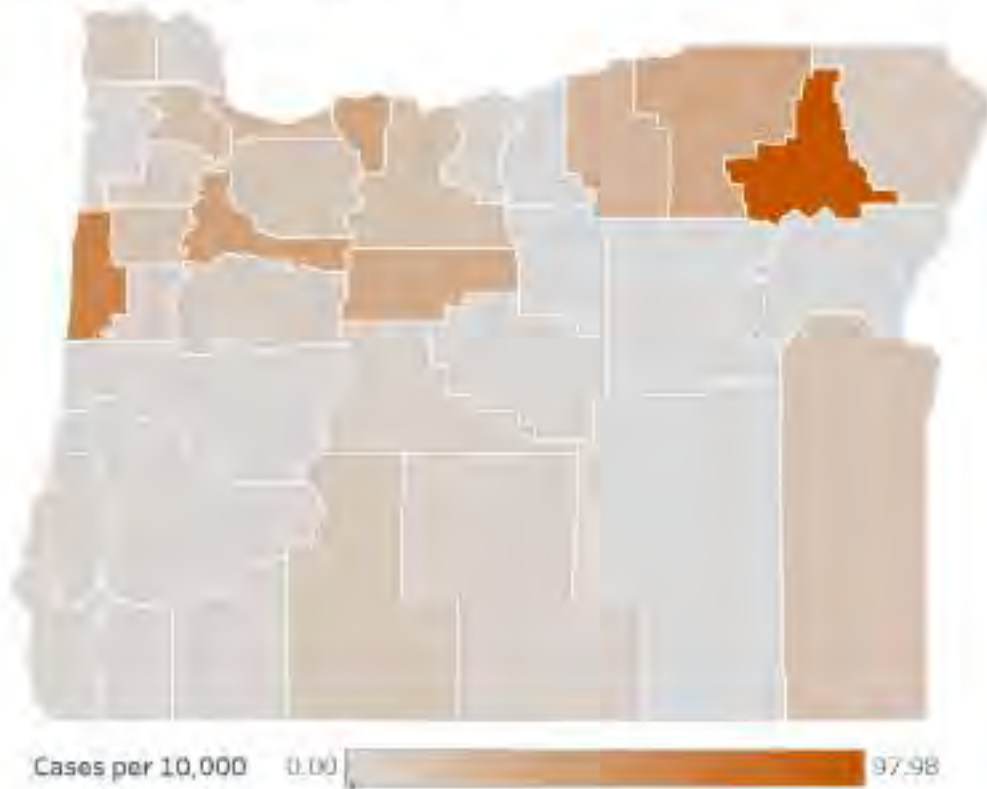

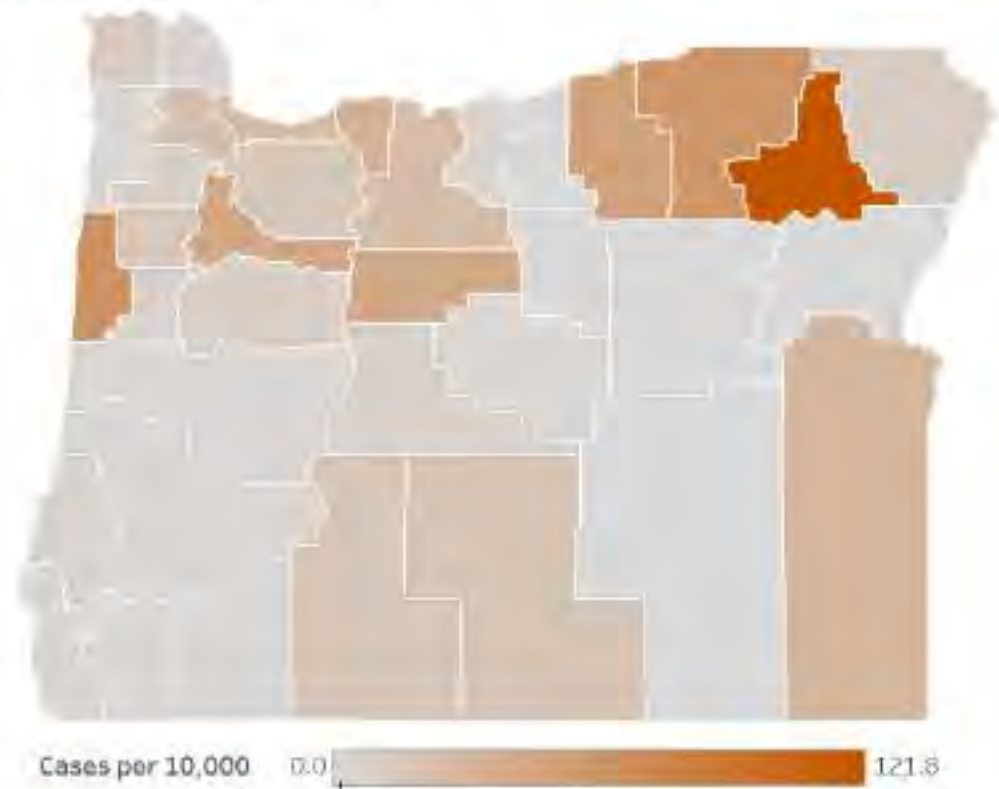

Confirmed Cases and Deaths by Illness Onset Date, and Hospitalizations by Admission Date

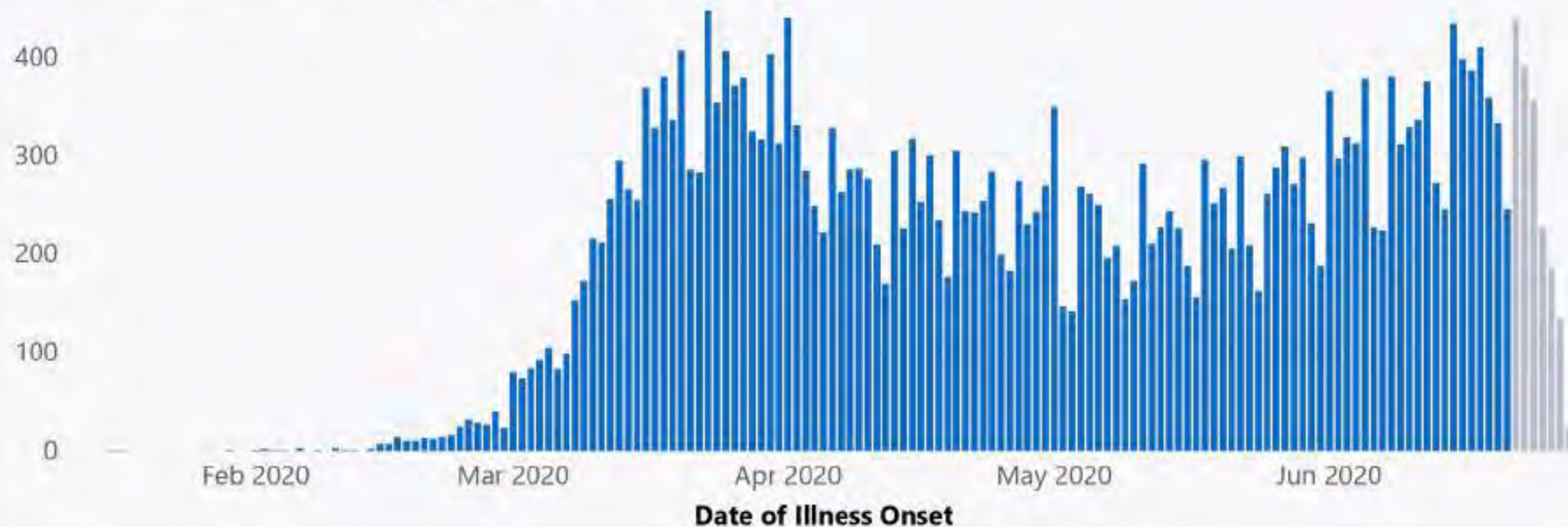

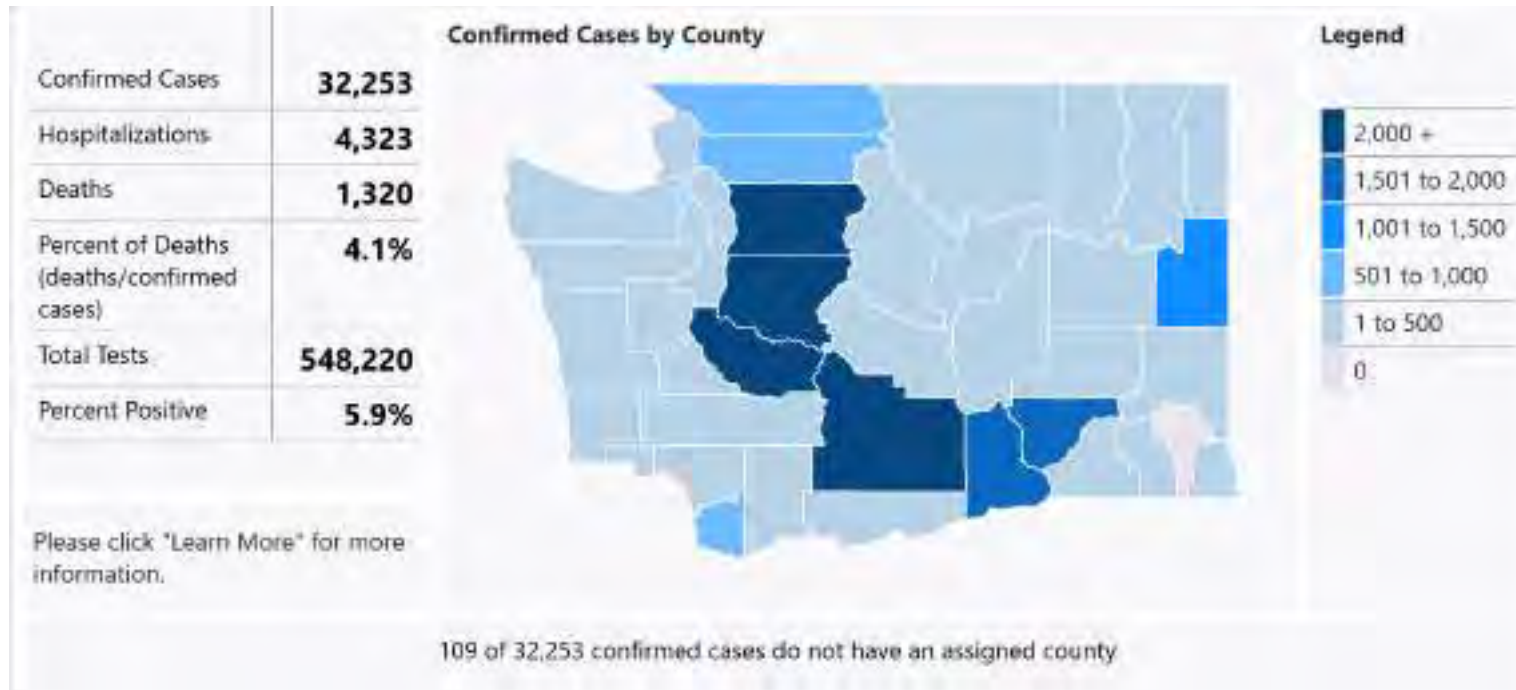

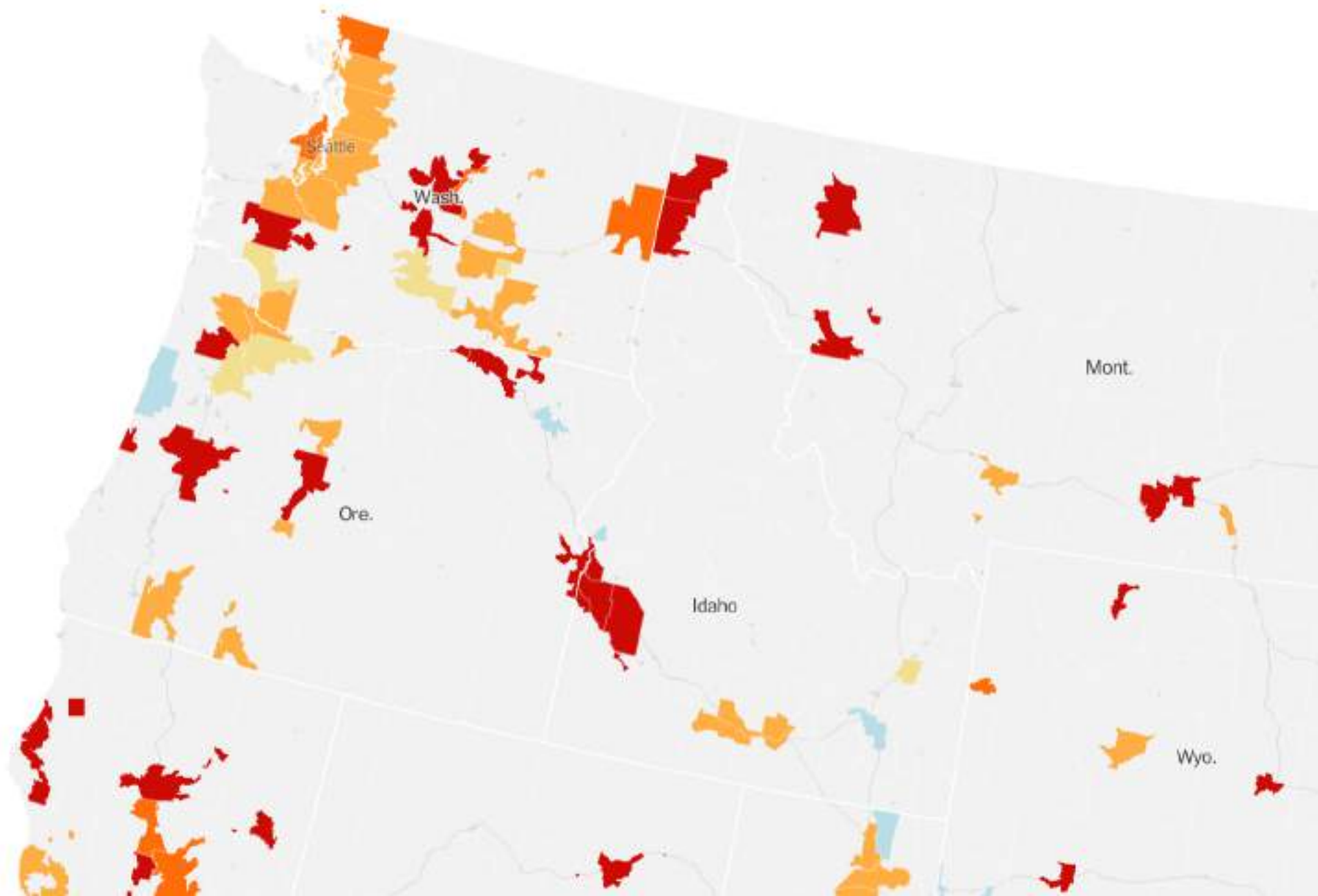

FIREWORK SAFETY

THIS INDEPENDENCE DAY, PLEASE BE COURTEOUS WHEN SETTING OFF FIREWORKS, WHICH MAY BE UPSETTING FOR DOGS AND MILITARY VETERANS

FOR VETERANS:

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LOUD, UNEXPECTED NOISES, such as fireworks, can be traumatic for veterans with PTSD or COMBAT DEPRESSION. They feel surprised or startled by the noise.

Consider your environment by wearing headphones or earplugs to help block out the noise of fireworks. Get to an open area.

FOR DOGS:

1 IN 5 DOGS GO MISSING AFTER BEING SCARED BY FIREWORKS

Many dogs go MISSING on the 4th of July every other day of the year because the loud noises that scare even the BRAVEST dog.

LOST

KEEP YOUR BEST FRIEND AT EASE:

- EXERCISE DURING THE DAY.** Enjoy your dog's company of exercise during the day to tire them out.
- STAY HOME.** Don't let your dog go outside unless there's no way to get out.
- MAKE THEM FEEL SAFE.** Provide a safe place to hide with their favorite toys.
- DISTRACTION.** Enter the house with their favorite toys and treats.
- ACT NORMAL.** Don't acknowledge the fireworks by reacting, as you may be reacting to your dog's reaction.
- NAME TAGS.** Make sure your dog's name tag is visible and readable (tag on the collar).

HAVE A SAFE AND HAPPY INDEPENDENCE DAY

DOGS RULE. SO DO WE. WORK WITH US. GILDAY CREATIVE

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Food

Clean: Make sure you clean all surfaces, utensils, and hands with soap and water.

Separate: When grilling, use separate plates and utensils for raw meat and cooked meat and ready-to-eat foods (like raw vegetables) to avoid cross-contamination.

Cook: Cook foods to the right temperature by using a food thermometer. That's the only way to know it's a safe temperature. Remember, burgers should be cooked to 160°F.

Chill: Chill raw and prepared foods promptly if not consuming after cooking. You shouldn't leave food at room temperature for longer than two hours (or 1 hour if outdoor temperatures are above 90° F), so if you're away from home, make sure you bring a cooler to store those leftovers.

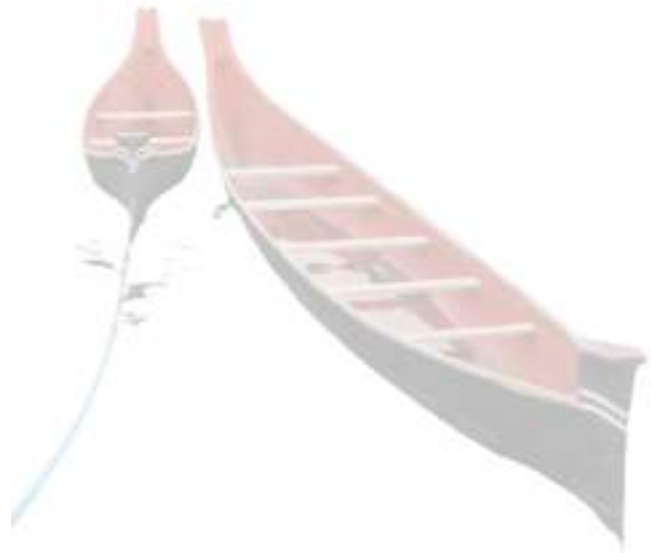

CARES ACT Provider Relief Fund Timeline

▶ APRIL

- April 10-17 - General Distribution 1: \$30 billion distributed to Medicare FFS providers based on 2019 FFS payments.
- April 24 - General Distribution: \$9.1 billion distributed to Medicare FFS providers based on revenues from CMS cost report data
- Starting April 24 - General Distribution: \$10.9 billion available to Medicare FFS providers based on revenue submissions to the provider portal.

▶ MAY

- May 29 - IHS: \$500 million to approximately 300 IHS programs.

▶ JUNE

- June 10 - Medicaid and CHIP (portal open): \$15 billion available to providers participating in state Medicaid and CHIP programs.
