

INDIAN TRIBAL ENERGY ACT PASSES CONGRESS AND HEADS TO PRESIDENT FOR SIGNATURE



On December 10, the House of Representatives passed S. 245, the Indian Tribal Energy Development and Self-Determination Act Amendments of 2017, which is designed to remove barriers to energy development. Energy has the potential to be a large economic driver for Indian Country and this bill, sponsored by Senator John Hoeven (R-ND), gives tribes greater autonomy over the management and development of their resources. S. 245, which passed the Senate in late 2017, now heads to the President for his signature.

"This legislation empowers tribes to manage their own energy resources, cuts red tape, drives economic growth and promotes energy development for Indian Country," said Senator Hoeven, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs.

Energy Resource Management

S. 245 is designed to streamline the Bureau of Indian Affairs' approval process for what are known as Tribal Energy Resource Agreements (TERAs). Under current law, a tribe may enter into a TERA with the federal government through which the tribe completes and manages business agreements with third parties regarding things like rights-of-way for energy projects, as well as oil and gas leases. Through such agreements, a tribe takes over managing activities that would otherwise be carried out by the Department of the Interior (DOI). S. 245 allows for a TERA application to be automatically be approved 270 days after submission to DOI and requires DOI to pay the tribe operating under a TERA agreement for carrying out the management activities.

Biomass Projects and Grant Eligibility for Intertribal Organizations
S.245 establishes a biomass pilot program for tribes to use non-marketable timber from neighboring federal lands for energy development. The bill also expands the Indian Energy Education Planning and Management Assistance Program to make intertribal organizations eligible for grants.

S.245 will also:

- Require the Department of Energy to collaborate with national laboratories to provide technical assistance to tribal governments.
- Improve efficiency by authorizing tribes and certified third parties to conduct energy appraisals, in addition to the Secretary of the Interior.
- Encourage the formation of joint tribal-industry ventures for purposes of developing tribal resources without secretarial approval, provided the tribe remains the majority owner and in control of the venture.
- Direct the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to treat tribes like states and municipalities when it comes to preferences for permits and original licenses for hydroelectric projects, where no preliminary permit has been issued.

Good Morning,

I just wanted to pass along some great resources regarding Human Trafficking. Recently there was a conversation in one of the IHS Area consultation meetings regarding how we (medical community serving AI/AN) can better identify, document, and provide services to patients experiencing Human Trafficking. It is really important for health care and survivor service organizations to participate in or connect with the human trafficking task forces within each state. I don't know of any other organization that has as many contacts with HT survivors as they do. Each state task force usually has regional meetings within the state and readily shares data among participating agencies. Referral agreements would be extremely helpful for I/T/U sites and HT law enforcement/shelters/social service organizations in order for the medical community to be kept in the loop and connect patients to services which other agencies often cannot offer (counseling, medical treatment, etc.).

If any listserv member is in need of assistance with identifying HT Task Force information, please reach out to me and I can find contact information for you specific state.

One of the first steps in improving our response is to complete training. Please promote the HT training specifically developed for health care providers through the Department of Health and Human Services: SOAR Into Health and Wellness. 






Public Health Emergency Preparedness & Response for Tribal Government Leaders



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Morehouse College's Project Imhotep is an eleven-week summer internship designed to increase the knowledge and skills of underrepresented minority students in biostatistics, epidemiology, and occupational safety and health, supported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Office of Minority Health and Health Equity (OMHHE).

The program begins with two weeks of intense educational training in the following public health courses: Public Health & Health Disparities, Epidemiology, Biostatistics (with SPSS training) and Scientific Writing. The purpose of this training is to equip interns with the academic information necessary to successfully complete the program. During the following nine weeks, interns are paired in a one-on-one mentored relationship with experts at CDC, academic institutions, local and state agencies, or community-based organizations to complete a public health research project. In addition, interns participate in a variety of seminars, workshops, educational initiatives and are required to complete 16 hours of community service.

Interns will culminate their experience by developing a research manuscript suitable for publication in a scientific journal and giving an oral poster presentation to their peers, mentors and other public health professionals. Interns receive a stipend, lodging on the campus of Morehouse College, course credit and travel expenses to and from their city of origin.

The Oral Health Project Director will work under the supervision of the Executive Director and close collaboration of the Policy Analyst to carry out their job duties.

Dear Tribal Representative:

In accordance with section 1902(a)(73)(A) of the Social Security Act regarding the solicitation of advice prior to the submission of any Medicaid State Plan Amendment (SPA) or 1915(b) waiver amendment likely to have a direct effect on Indians, Indian Health Programs, or Urban Indian Organizations, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare (Idaho Medicaid) seeks your advice on the following matter.

Purpose

Idaho Medicaid is complying with Idaho Code §56-267, as certified into law on November 20, 2018. This statute directs the Department to add healthcare coverage under the Medicaid State Plan for individuals from the age of nineteen (19) up to the age of sixty-five (65) with Modified Adjusted Gross Income less than or equal to one hundred thirty-three (133%) of the federal poverty level, who are not otherwise eligible for coverage under the Medicaid State Plan, in accordance with section 1902(a)(10)(A)(i)(VIII) and 1902(14) of the Social Security Act.

Idaho Medicaid must submit multiple policy actions to accomplish this work, which will include State Plan and 1915(b) waiver amendments, as required by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Our policy actions will require documents to support:

- Adding the Adult Group as a covered eligibility group within our existing Basic and Enhanced Alternative Benefit Plans (ABP's)
- Adding the Adult Group as a covered eligibility group within our existing 1915(b) managed care waivers for behavioral health and dental services
- Amending existing State Plan pages to add the Adult Group as a covered population
- Amending existing State Plan pages for hospital presumptive eligibility processes and procedures to add the Adult Group
- Adding a new section of State Plan pages to describe operational procedures the State must follow when determining eligibility to secure the 90/10 federal matching rate for the Adult Group
- Other State Plan pages, as determined through consultation with CMS

Proposed Effective Date

The Department intends to submit these policy actions to CMS on or before February 19, 2019 with a proposed effective date of January 1, 2020.

Anticipated Impact on Indians/Tribal Health Programs/Urban Indian Organizations (ITU) We anticipate these policy changes will significantly improve access to Medicaid services for some Idaho resident members of tribes. It will have significant impacts for Tribal Health Programs who serve this population. The Department is dedicated to working in a collaborative effort with the Tribes to address any concerns or questions you may have regarding impacts to your facilities or members.

Comments, Input, and Tribal Concerns

Idaho Medicaid would appreciate any input or concerns that Tribal Representatives wish to share regarding these changes. In order to allow for a timely submission to CMS, please submit any comments for these changes **prior to January 16, 2019** via email to: Cindy.Brock@dhw.idaho.gov.

Idaho Medicaid's development of these policy changes will be shared in more detail and reviewed as part of the Policy Update at the next quarterly Tribal meeting, currently scheduled for February 20, 2019 in Boise, Idaho.
