Lone Pine Paiute-Shoshone Tribe's Wellness Program -Tobacco-

Lone Pine Paiute-Shoshone Reservation (LPPSR) was awarded funding from CRIHB for both the Advancing California Opportunities to Renew Native health Systems (ACORNS) and the California Indian Tobacco Education (CITE) programs funded through GHWIC. Both grant projects are maintained by the Wellness Team which is led by Mariah L. David. Mariah grew up in the area but went to film school in Los Angeles, and then wanted to come back and use her skills to give back to her community. As part of their CITE project this last year, the LPPSR Wellness Team decided to create short educational videos about the impacts of commercial tobacco use and exposure. Their approach was to interview members of their community who have been impacted by it, and then share those stories out through social media and other avenues. This way their community gets health and wellness messages from people within their own community. Mariah and her team's passion for wellness, goes above and beyond the requirements of this grant. They have de-

veloped the Payahuunadu Alliance, which is a team of folks who meet regularly to build partnerships and collaboration in order to promote culture and wellness in their community and ultimately, Indian Country. The name of their alliance comes from the Nüümü (Paiute) word for the valley that their people are from, also known as the Owens Valley. We are so proud to present these videos and promote the good work of LPPSR, Mariah, and her team.
