Dear Tribal Partners,

As you know, all the States in Region X have higher than the national average suicide prevalence. In fact, three of our four States are in the top 10 nationally. The prevalence of suicide in Tribal communities in Region X continues to be higher as well, and the impacts on Tribal communities of a completed suicide are disproportionate in scale. Fortunately there have been several Garrett Lee Smith grants awarded to States and Tribes in Region X in the past several years to help communities develop prevention strategies to reduce suicides.

SAMHSA is now announcing a new funding opportunity that will be available to States, Tribes, and others to help promote the Zero Suicide initiative across entire health systems. I encourage you to review this Funding Opportunity Announcement for full details:

The The Native American Conservation Corps (NACC) is specifically designed to provide hands on training and experience to Native American young adults living in the Greater Portland metropolitan area who are interested in pursuing employment with conservation corps, land and water resource management agencies, and other outdoor careers. The NACC integrates team-based work projects, education, and on-site vocational training into an experience that prioritizes personal growth, and the development of conservation work skills. Participants will develop technical skills working on a variety of conservation projects while developing the soft skills needed to be successful in the outdoor industry.

NACC participants spend 12 weeks camping, working and traveling together as a five person team. You can expect to work on physically challenging conservation projects in many kinds of weather, gaining hands on experience in the groundwork of stewardship. Each day, you will return to camp after work and participate in community activities, including meal prep, water collection and treatment, and tool maintenance, followed by a family style dinner. Evenings will be spent on various educational and recreational activities; including formal lessons taught by team members, group discussions, and stargazing around the campfire.

Overview:

- Projects take place on the Mt. Rainier Wonderland Trail in Washington.
- Participants will earn a living allowance of \$3630 for their term of service, prorated throughout the program in addition to a \$1527 AmeriCorps education award upon the successful completion of the program.

<u>Job Summary</u>: The Office Assistant will provide administrative and general support on scheduled short-term assignments or when the NPAIHB needs administrative support with short notice due to employee absence. This position will work on an as needed basis during regular office hours. The tasks may include staff support tasks at conferences and training sessions held off-site.

When working at the front desk, the Office Assistant has primary responsibility to answer a multi-line telephone system, routing callers and visitors in a courteous and professional manner, and to provide clerical support for NPAIHB staff. The Office Assistant must ensure the smooth functioning of the reception area, serve as the first contact to the general public and be the first representative of the Board to all visitors. <u>Physical Demands:</u> Frequently involves sedentary work: exerting up to 10 pounds of force and/or a negligible amount of force to lift, carry, push, pull or otherwise move objects, including the human body.

<u>Physical Requirements:</u> Constantly requires the ability to receive detailed information through oral communications, and to make fine discrimination in sound. SAMHSA Zero Suicide Grant

Grantees will implement all components of the Zero Suicide model throughout their health system.

Dear Tribal Representatives:

On March 31, 2017, The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's (IDHW) renewal for the 1915b Idaho Behavior Health Plan waiver. This waiver included special terms and conditions agreed upon between Idaho, tribal nations in Idaho and CMS that responded to specific tribal concerns. In conjunction with that approval, we also issued a formal policy statement indicating our intent to work with tribes around future development of tribal managed care approaches to service delivery.

We are convening a workgroup consisting of representatives of Indian Health Care Providers, State Medicaid staff, and Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board (NPAIHB) staff to outline the actions, resources and timelines necessary to implement a tribal managed care program consistent with federal requirements for Medicaid.

This workgroup will assist us in developing a planning report to be delivered to the Director of the IDHW and the Chairs of Tribes in Idaho and the NPAIHB no later than October 1, 2017. Following the delivery of this, Idaho will continue working collaboratively with tribes who are interested in implementing a managed care program.

Subject: Approval of Idaho Behavioral Health Plan 1915(b)(4) Waiver Renewal

CMS has approved Idaho's renewal of its 1915(b) waiver for the Idaho Behavioral Health Plan. Idaho Department of Health and Welfare staff have worked closely with representatives from tribal sovereign nations in Idaho around special terms and conditions included with this renewal.

Due to limitations in federal authority, CMS was not able to incorporate all the elements that Idaho had agreed on with tribes into the approved waiver and special terms and conditions. To demonstrate Idaho's continued commitment to the tribes in this regard, Medicaid is releasing this formal policy statement:

Agreement to Collaborate on Indian Managed Care Entity Development.

The Idaho Department of Health & Welfare (IDHW) recognizes that Tribes have significant capabilities for managing the care of their tribal members and other Indians to achieve positive behavioral health outcomes.

IDHW will collaborate with interested Tribes in Idaho to explore and develop an approach to Tribal managed care for behavioral health services. IDHW will convene a workgroup consisting of representatives of Indian Health Care Providers (IHCP's), state Medicaid staff, and Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board (NPAIHB) staff to outline the actions, resources and timelines necessary to implement an Indian Managed Care Entity (IMCE).

The initial planning report will be delivered to the Director of the IDHW and the chairs of Tribes in Idaho and the NPAIHB no later than 6 months following the approval date of the IBHP waiver renewal. Following the delivery of the initial planning report, Idaho agrees to continue working collaboratively with interested Tribes to implement an IMCE.

IDHW will make changes to the 1915(b) waiver as necessary to support the Tribes in Idaho and the implementation of an IMCE.

Exemption of Certain Property from Resources for Medicaid and CHIP Eligibility.

Idaho will disregard the property listed in 42 U.S.C. 1396a(ff) from resources for the purposes of determining the eligibility of an individual who is an Indian for medical assistance.

The IDHW is willing to enter into binding memorandums of agreement with individual tribes in Idaho reflecting these commitments, or to amend existing memorandums between the IDHW and individual tribes to incorporate these provisions at tribal request.

We thank tribes for their engagement with IDHW in this process and for their past and continued care for Idaho Medicaid participants.
