Tribal Heritage Grants, National Parks Service

he National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 authorizes grants to Federally recognized Indian tribes for cultural and historic preservation projects. These grants assist Indian Tribes, Alaskan Natives, and Native Hawaiian Organizations in protecting and promoting their unique cultural heritage and traditions. Nonfederal matching share is not required, but preference will be given to applications that show community commitment through non-federal match and partnership collaboration. Grants may fund a broad range of planning, development, and research projects for cultural resources including: survey, inventory, oral histories, interpretation, education, architectural services, historic structure reports, preservation plans, and bricks and mortar repair. Funding amount: \$5,000 to \$60,000. Read more here. Deadline: March 27, 2017



Agricultural Marketing Service Grants, United States Department of Agriculture

he U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service announces the availability of \$27 million in grants to fund innovative projects designed to strengthen market opportunities for local and regional food producers and businesses. The Local Food Promotion Program offers grant funds with a 25% match to support the development and expansion of local and regional food business enterprises to increase domestic consumption of, and access to, locally and regionally produced agricultural products, and to develop new market opportunities for farm and ranch operations serving local markets. The purpose of the Farmers Market Promotion Program is to increase domestic consumption of, and access to, locally and regionally produced agricultural products, and to develop new market opportunities for farm and ranch operations serving local markets by developing, improving, expanding, and providing outreach, training, and technical assistance to, or assisting in the development, improvement, and expansion of, domestic farmers markets, roadside stands, communitysupported agriculture programs, agritourism activities, and other direct producer-to-consumer market opportunities.
