

What is a Dental Therapist?

A primary oral health care provider and an integral part of the dental team.

What do they do?

Focus on **preventive** oral health care **AND** treat dental disease. Can do some of the procedures that a dentist can do (<70 out of >500 procedures).

How do they do it?

Receive as much training as dentists, or more, for procedures in their scope.

Held to the same high standard of care to which dentists are held.

Must be licensed or certified (depending on jurisdiction).

Work within the team, under license of a supervising dentist.




A Brief History of Dental Therapy



- Since 1921 in New Zealand
- NZ program a success!
- Now dental therapists are employed in 54 countries
- 2000: Alaska tribal leaders seek solution to oral health crisis
- 2005: First dental therapists practicing in AK (trained in NZ)
- 2006: ANTHC graduates first class of dental therapists
- 2016: First dental therapist practicing in WA (trained in AK)
- 2019: Dental therapists approved to practice in 10 US states

- Creates an oral health team that is more efficient and effective



Dental Health Aide Therapists in Alaska – blue









CTCLUSI Today

- Naomi practicing under general supervision
 - Will be out in the community with Head Start
- Marissa in preceptorship
- Passed 2018 Oregon Health Authority site visit with flying colors
- Year 1 report (including preceptorships) shows:
 - Increase in patients seen (7%)
 - Increase in procedures done (12%)
 - Increase in Level 4 and 5 procedures done
 - High patient satisfaction
- 1st half of year 2 report (including preceptorship):
 - On track to nearly triple number of patients seen this year compared to baseline year

CTCLUSI Patient Comments

- 2/3 of patients say CTCLUSI clinic is better than private clinics
 - 8% say it's not as good, the rest feel it's the same.

Comments include:

- I feel comfortable that they are familiar with Native Americans and are not prejudiced.
- I felt my concerns were heard. I was treated like family, not a credit card.
- The care at CTCLUSI is more personal. The staff is friendly and show genuine care for the patient and knowledge when it comes to ancestry.
- Care is respectful and I just feel better being here. They don't make me feel bad.
- It's great to know the people who work on you! It was great to have [a dental therapist] who was a young person going through a program to become an awesome adult.
- CTCLUSI has always been great with my children. They are patient and understand the difference with youth and native teeth.



NARA

- In one year after adding a dental therapist:
 - 57% increase in patients seen at clinic
 - 105% increase in young patients seen at clinic
 - High patient satisfaction with care provided by dental therapist
- Recently hired a new dentist and a new clinic manager
- Dental therapist Kari will begin this year

Swinomish Today

- Increase in patients seen
- Completing treatment plans faster
- Dentists doing almost 50% more crown, bridge, and partials
- More efficient "urgent" care time
- Daniel is out in the community every week
 - Head Start Program: brushing and flossing
 - Delivering meals to elders in the community
- Two Swinomish Dental Therapy students are set to graduate from the ADTEP class of 2019!

- Wait time is almost gone
- Rochelle Ferry (Roz) is out in the community
 - Head Start Program
 - Exams and sealants
 - Home Visits with Home Health Nurse
 - elders and diabetic population,
 - Exams, listening and bringing people BACK into care
- Roz is the only full time provider at the clinic
- The community is happy to see Roz
- More elders than ever before are getting care.



Accomplishments:

- Dental Therapy is an established and growing profession in the Portland Area
- 8 current students and four graduated students from Portland Area
- Pilot Project in Oregon on track
- Funding secured for DT education program in WA
- Funding secured for next 3 years of NDTI project
- Legislation passed in WA (2017) and ID (2019)
- Medicaid reimbursement approved (6.5M)
- Strong infrastructure to support dental therapists





2019 Goals



Swinomish Dental Clinic, 2019

- Support clinics integrating DT into dental team
- DTEP at SVC: hire director, curriculum, CODA
- Lay groundwork for legislation in Oregon
- Continued success for Oregon Pilot Project
- OR Tribes adding new clinics (Coquille, possibly Cow Creek)
- Work toward implementing a full CHAP program
