Dear Tribal Leader:

On June 6, 2018, the Public Law 115-182, VA Maintaining Internal Systems and Strengthening Integrated Outside Networks of 2018 (MISSION Act), was signed into law by President Trump. In order to find new ways to help improve the quality of care our nation's Veterans so richly deserve, the MISSION Act requires the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to develop a strategic plan to meet health care demands in consultation with a variety of stakeholders, including tribal government leaders.

We recognize that Native American Veterans have an important role in shaping the future of VA health care and therefore we are turning to you for input on the following questions:

- 1. What are the most important health care needs of Veterans in your area now and in the future?
- 2. If you were to redesign the VA health care system, what are the five most important changes, if any, you would like to suggest? This could include patient care, customer service, and billing and payment to name a few.
- 3. What are the top three to five recommendations you would make to help VA improve how it provides care to Native American Veterans who use VA health care?
- 4. What changes, if any, would you recommend to how VA develops and modifies its surveys to Veterans who use VA health care?

Your responses to these questions will inform the strategic plan and surveys of Veterans who use VA health care.



Host a Healthcare Focused Internship

The Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board and We Are Healers are committed to supporting American Indian & Alaska Native youth (14-24 years old) interested in pursuing healthcare professions.

Please consider hosting a student intern or connecting them to this paid job shadow opportunity!



Stipend: Selected youth will receive **\$600** to cover their internship time and/or travel.

Scope of Work: Host sites will provide student interns with hands-on training in health careers, health promotion strategies, research and evaluation methods, or community-based participatory research.

Duration: The timing and duration of the internship can be determined by the site. We've seen some internships last two weeks (working full time), and others last a semester (working a few hours per week).

Instructions: Please fill out an online application form

- Site Application Form Priority will be given to sites who already have a youth intern identified, but applications will also be accepted from sites needing help finding a match. Site Application Form >>
- Youth Stipend Application Form. Priority will be given to youth who already have a host site identified - but applications will also be accepted from youth needing help finding a match. Youth Stipend Application Form >>

Number of Awards Available: 12 or more per year

Due Date: Applications will be filled on a rolling basis and are due by **July 1**, **2019**.

Evaluation: At the end of the internship, we will ask you to complete this brief online **Youth Feedback Form** and **Site Feedback Form**, to help document internship activities and outcomes.

Payment Process: Unless otherwise requested, checks will be made out to the youth (requiring a social security number), but will be mailed to the host site for payment after the internship.



Can sites host more than one intern? Yes. Sites can host up to 4 student interns.

QPR Gatekeeper Instructor Certification Course

For any person or organization interested in preventing suicide in their community

Course Description:

This certification course trains Instructors to teach *QPR for Suicide Prevention* to their community. Participants first learn about the nature of suicidal communications, what forms these communications take and how they may be used as the stimulus for a QPR intervention. To gain perspective, participants are introduced to the history of suicide, suicide prevention and the spectrum of modern day public health suicide prevention education efforts. The history, background and research support for QPR are reviewed. Participants then learn to market QPR, target potential Gatekeepers, and how to teach the QPR curriculum. Participants also learn to deal with pent up audience demand to talk about suicide, survivor issues and how to make immediate interventions and referrals. Each participant has the opportunity for individual rehearsal and practice through role-plays.

Course Objectives:

- To understand the nature, range and importance of suicidal communications and their importance in preventing suicide.
- To review and understand the groups at greatest risk of suicide and why QPR can work for them.
- To train participants to teach QPR, for Suicide Prevention.
- To gain a historical perspective about suicide prevention and how QPR fits into national efforts.
- To acquire specific knowledge about how audiences may respond to the QPR message and how to react in a helpful manner.
- To learn how to effectively promote suicide prevention in their own communities.
- To gain the competence and confidence to teach others how to save lives and help prevent suicidal behaviors.

- New and promising approaches to suicide prevention
- Targeting prevention education efforts
- Review of the QPR video
- Teaching QPR
- Facilitating role plays
- Handling questions from audiences

- Expanding QPR to other community prevention efforts
- Completion of training evaluations
- Orientation to the national QPR network and QPR Institute
- Awarding of three year Instructor Certificates

Culturally-Responsive Approaches & Resources for Survivors of Abuse in Indian Country

The Response Circles domestic & sexual violence prevention project at the **Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board** is offering a training on "Culturally-Responsive Approaches & Resources for Survivors of Abuse in Indian Country" for Tribal members or professionals serving Tribes who may provide support to survivors of domestic and sexual violence or respond to disclosures.

StrongHearts Description: Launched in 2017, the StrongHearts Native Helpline (1-844-7NATIVE), is a free, confidential and culturally-appropriate domestic violence and dating violence helpline created by and for American Indians and Alaska Natives across the U.S. As a collaborative project of the National Indigenous Women's Resource Center and the National Domestic Violence Hotline. The helpline offers peer-to-peer emotional support, crisis intervention, assistance with safety planning, and a connection to local Native resources and can be reached at 1-844-7NATIVE (762-8483) daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. CST nationwide. To date, more than 2,500 callers have reached out to the StrongHearts Native Helpline for support on their healing journey. However, it is clear that more resources are needed, as there continues to be a severe gap in culturally-responsive services that are specialized to serve Native survivors of abuse.

Training Objectives: As result of this training, attendees will be able to:

- Understand the dynamics of domestic violence and dating violence, along with abusive "red flags" in relationships.
- Recognize unique barriers to justice and safety faced by victims and survivors of abuse in Indian Country.
- Discuss the need for more culturally-based services to support domestic violence and sexual assault victims and survivors in tribal communities.
- Identify available services and educational tools offered by the StrongHearts Native Helpline (1-844-7NATIVE).

Who Should Attend: Advocates, Counselors, Social Services, Case Workers, Victim Services, Educators, Healthcare Providers, Mental Health Providers, Community Health Representatives, Recreation & Youth Services, Law Enforcement, Family Violence Services and Court Representatives.
