COWLITZ TRIBE HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES

- Cowlitz provides services at 4 sites along the I-5 corridor and within a 10-county area to:
 - 413 Cowlitz Members
 - 2,730 Visits
 - 1913 Tribal Members from over 200 different Tribes
 - 11,246 Visits
 - 971 Non-Tribal citizens
 - 18,572 Visits
- 185 HHS employees
 - 47 Enrolled Members of Tribes
 - 138 Non-Indian

FINANCIAL SUPPORT- \$21,755,000

- Health Services:
- \$9.25m in Indian Health Service funds
- \$7.8m in third party revenue
- \$3m in State grant funding





- Human Services:
- \$1.4m for Pathways to Healing funding
- \$1m Cowlitz Employment and Support Services
- \$293k for Elders program funding









CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES

- Began providing services in 2004.
- Services Cowlitz Indian Tribal Members in the Contract Health Services Delivery Area (CHSDA).
- CHSDA includes: Clark, Cowlitz, Skamania,
 Wahkiakum, Columbia (OR), Lewis, Thurston, Pierce,
 King, and Kittitas Counties.
- o Tribe has over 4,100 members (about 2,000 in the CHSDA).
- CHS funds are used to provide specialty services such as optical and dental not available at a tribal clinic.
- CHS is a payer of last resort.



FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE 2020

- Health Services:
- \$9.8m third party revenue
- \$7.15 m- Indian Health Service funds
- \$742 k- Contracts
- Smaller grants and contracts

- Human Services:
- \$1.4m for Pathways to Healing funding
- \$679k for Vocational Rehab funding
- \$326k Elders Programing
- Smaller grant and contracts

- The Longview clinic opened in 2004 and moved to the current facility in 2011.
- Services include:
 - Primary Care
 - Medically-Assisted Treatment
 - Tribal Assister Services
 - Health Education and Diabetes
 Prevention
 - Employee Wellness
 - Tribal Garden

- Began providing services in 2004 within the medical clinic in Longview.
- o Services offered in Vancouver beginning in 2009.
- Services offered in Seattle beginning in 2010.
- Services include:
 - o Psychiatric Diagnostic Assessment
 - Individual Therapy
 - Co-Occurring Therapy
 - Medically-Assisted Treatment (Seattle)
 - Family Therapy
 - Group Therapy
 - Medication Management
 - Positive Indian Parenting
 - VOCA-Specific Therapy

- Services available in the office, school, home, or community.
- Services available in Longview,
 Vancouver, and Seattle. Opening new site in Dupont.

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
MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT)

- The Seattle clinic began offering MAT in 2017 for the treatment of opioid use disorders.
- The Longview clinic was recently awarded grant funds to initiate MAT services.
- Will start to provide additional MAT services in Vancouver

- Available at all sites




COWLITZ EMPLOYMENT AND SUPPORT SERVICES

- Services include:

 - Vocational Guidance and Counseling






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- Provides advocacy services AI/AN who have been affected by sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, trafficking, or stalking.

COWLITZ TRIBAL ELDERS PROGRAM

- Provides congregate meals to American Indians and Alaska Natives residing in Lewis, Clark, and Cowlitz Counties.
- Provides meal delivery for individuals who are home-bound.
- Provides transportation, caregiver support, cultural activities, outings, and more.
- Funded through the Federal Agency on Aging.
