AmeriCorps State and National Tribal Grants provide funding to engage AmeriCorps members in evidence-based or evidence-informed interventions to strengthen communities. Priority areas include - Efforts to help local communities respond to and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic; Educational opportunity and economic mobility for communities experiencing persistent unemployment or underemployment, and students experiencing homelessness or those in foster care; Programs that prioritize civic engagement/social cohesion; Education - improving student academic performance in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), and/or serving students who attend Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) schools, among other areas.
