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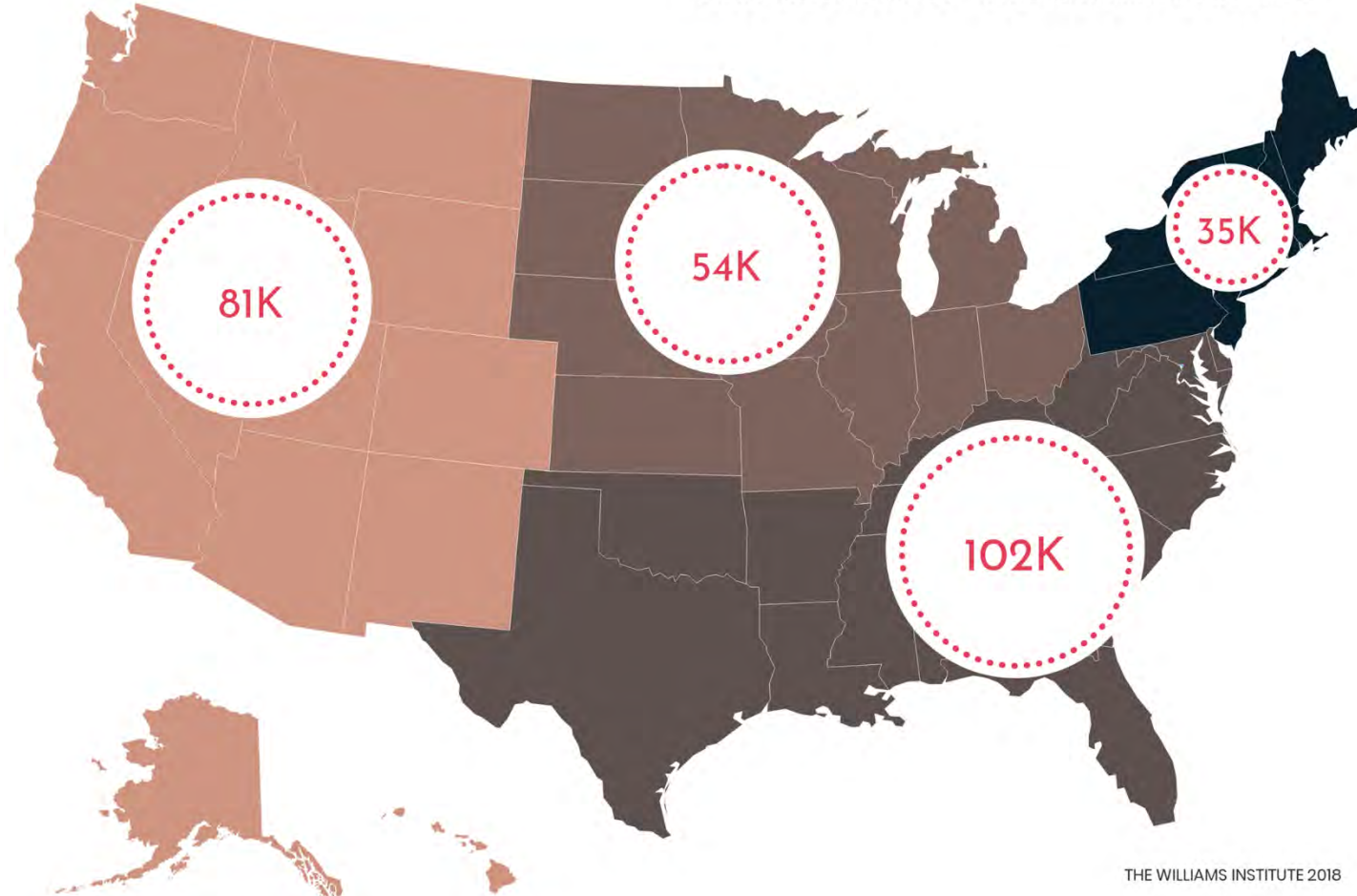

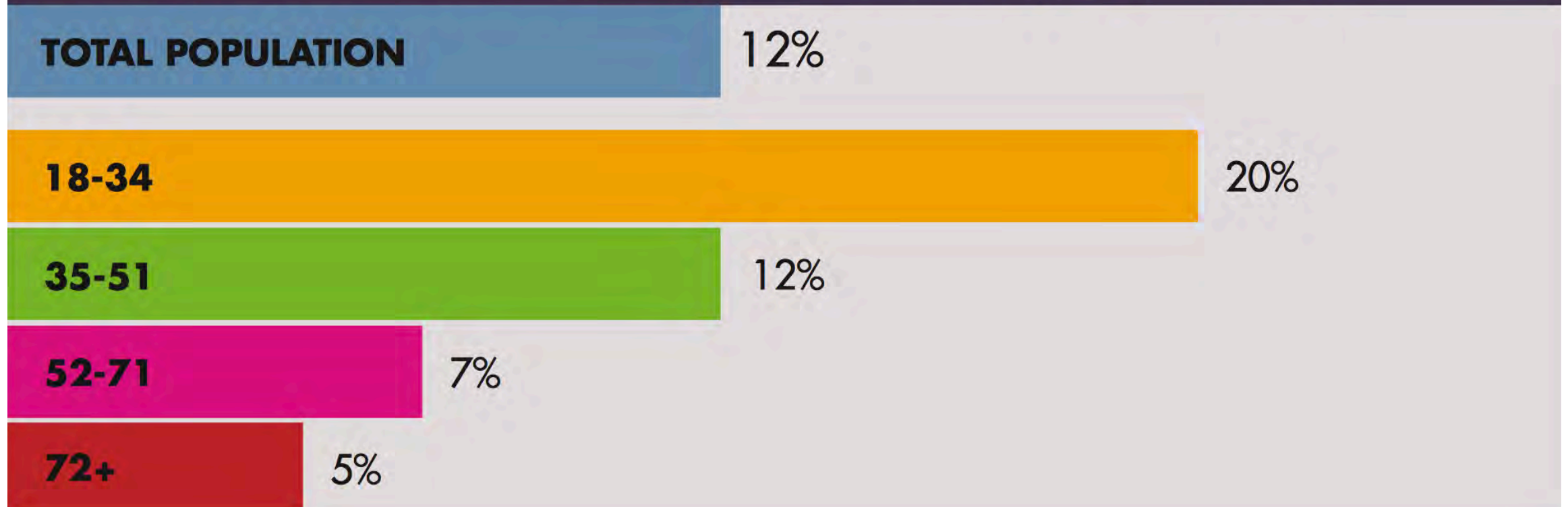

% of people who identify as LGBTQ by age group



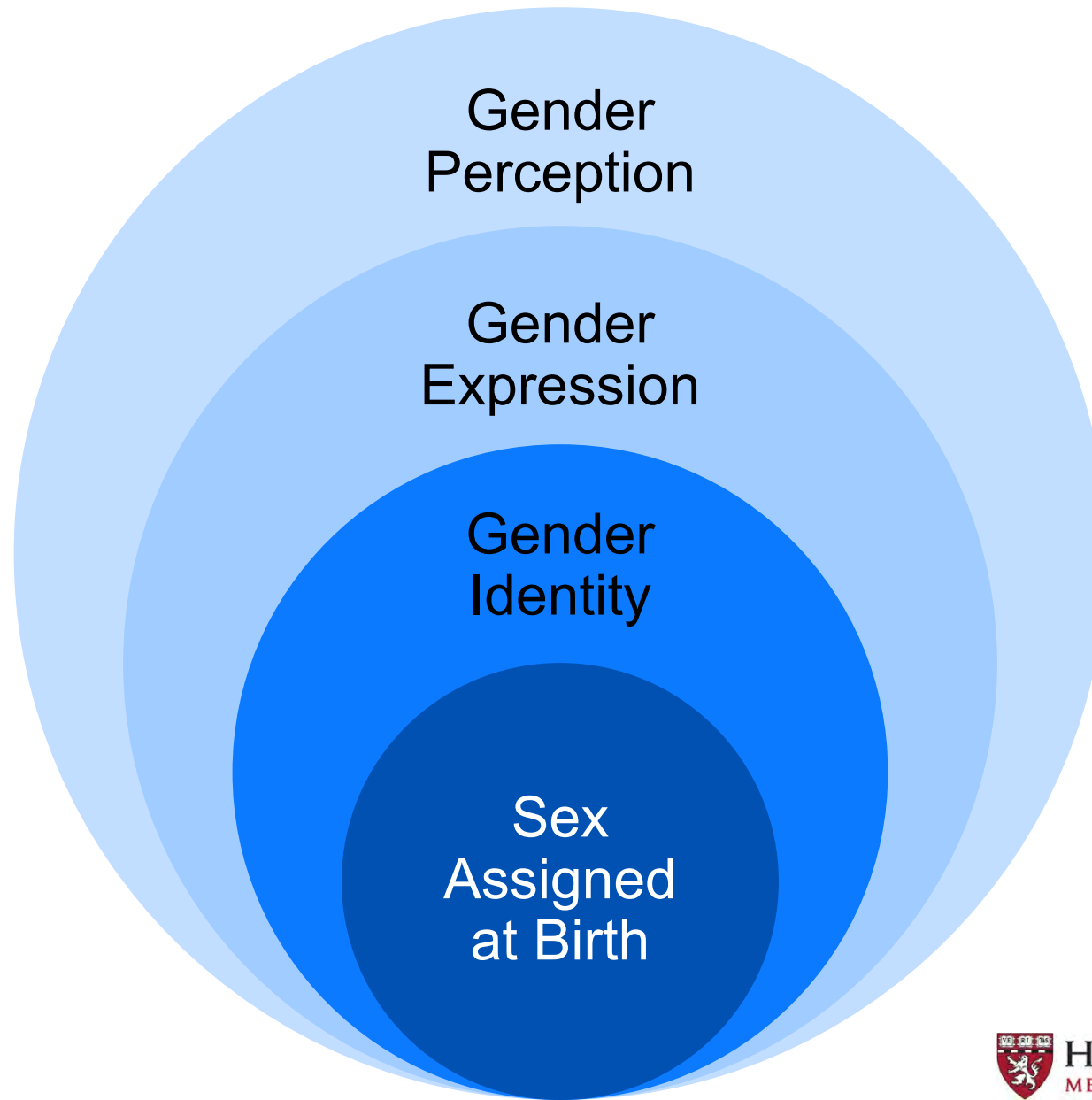
Gender Identity (GI)

- A person's inner sense of being a girl/woman, boy/man, something else, or having no gender at all.
- Gender Identity does not necessarily align in a traditional sense with the sex a person is assigned at birth (typically female, male or intersex).
- Gender Identity may also change over time for some people.

- Homosexuality removed from *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM)*

1980

- Transsexualism added to *DSM-III*

Transgender, Nonbinary, and Two-Spirit Inclusion



Avoid:

ladies **gentlemen** **ma'am** **sir** **girls** **guys** etc.

Consider using instead:

“Thanks, **friends**.
Have a great
night.”

“Good morning,
folks!”

“Hi, **everyone!**”

“And for **you?**”

“Can I get
you **all**
something?”

Why?

Shifting to gender-inclusive language respects and acknowledges the gender identities of all people and removes assumption.
