Data Hub Security Architecture


NWTEC staff have secure logins to access QuickSight & build Data Hub Dashboards.

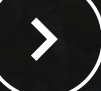

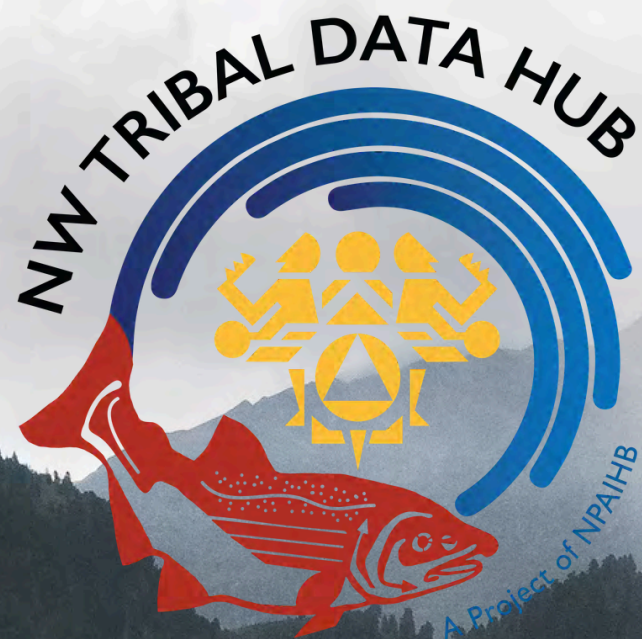

DOH Values & Commitment to Tribal Sovereignty

DOH Value – Seven Generations:

- Inspired by Native American culture, we seek wisdom and perspective from those who came before us. We honor them by listening to many voices and those that might help us see our challenges more completely. And take shared action to support those who come after us.

Transformational Plan Priority:

- Co-create robust data sharing capabilities and systems with local health jurisdictions, with Tribes honoring Tribal data sovereignty, and other stakeholders to support better detection, understanding, and addressing of the burden of disease and health inequities.

What is a Data Sharing Agreement?

Defines how confidential data is shared between two or more parties

Ensures that confidential information (Category 3 & Category 4) is handled in compliance with state and federal laws

Protects privacy and security of confidential information

Defines the roles and obligations of each party involved in the data sharing process and fosters collaboration

Building the Tribal DSA Template

First draft created (Jan 2025)

- Combination of Tulalip Tribes DSA & Governor's Indian Health Advisory Committee's (GIHAC) Tribal Data Sovereignty Principles

Formal Consultation with Tribes (Dec 2024 – March 2025)

- Conducted two roundtables and a consultation session to receive feedback from Tribal leaders and representatives on the draft
- Incorporated feedback from Tribes

Template as a starting point to begin negotiations for a TDSA with DOH

- Helps to maintain some consistency across Tribes.
- Reduce burden of time commitment for negotiations.
- Tribes are still able to negotiate for their individual needs.

Purpose of a Tribal DSA

- Uphold **Tribal Data Sovereignty**.
 - Tribes' right to control their data including how it is collected, used, and shared.
- Co-create robust data sharing capabilities and systems with Tribal Nations.
 - Tribal Nations are **public health authorities** and **sovereign nations**.
 - Umbrella DSA format – each Tribe can have one DOH DSA with exhibits for each data system.
- Supports Tribes' right to govern their data and provide consent to its use.
- Strengthen **government-to-government** relationships.
- Improve overall public health practices by coordinating more with Tribes and local health jurisdictions.

Key Differences for Tribal DSAs

Tribal DSAs are built on the foundation of **government-to-government relationships** and **Tribal self-determination**.



- Recognizing Tribes as **co-owners** of their Tribal data.
- One **unified TDSA** can cover access to **multiple systems**
- **Informed consent** of use of Tribal data. If requested, create a form process to approve/deny use of Tribal data.
- **Institutional requirement** for DOH to obtain permission to use Tribal data and educate staff on sovereignty

Accomplishments of Tribal DSA Implementation



Built a data access form for Tribes on the DOH Partner Hub.



Developed a process for DOH staff to seek approval for the use of Tulalip Tribe's data with "Tribal Data Use Form."



Provided 3 trainings for DOH staff on Tribal Data Sovereignty.



Worked with GIHAC to develop Tribal Data Sovereignty Principles added to DOH's External DSA Template.



Facilitated access to one data system for Tulalip Tribes.

Workplace Safety for Workers Affected by Climate Change grant

Purpose: The Workplace Safety for Workers Affected by Climate Change grant program is intended to benefit outdoor workers affected by changes to our climate, including but not limited to extreme heat and cold, wildfire smoke, drought, and flooding. Funding may be used to 1) support workplace health and safety for workers who are burdened by the intersection of their work and climate impacts, and/or 2) procure supplies that benefit outdoor workers who are affected by climate impacts in the work and cover distribution costs of supplies/resources.

Funding per Grantee: \$15,151


